Opening Prayer

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Reading

(to be read by the Leader)

He entered Jericho and was passing through it. A man was there named Zacchaeus he was a chief tax collector and was rich. He was trying to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not because he was short in stature. So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see him because he was going to pass that way. When Jesus came to the place he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down; for I must stay at your house today." So he hurried down and was happy to welcome him. All who saw it began to grumble and said, "He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner." Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much." Then Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house because he too is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost.

The Reflection

(to be read by the leader)

We live in a time in which we are informed by the media of all global needs. The whole world has shrunk into a global village. Therefore the Church has called for solidarity between all peoples – Vatican II (41 years ago) states already: "Now that, through better means of communication, distances between peoples have been almost eliminated, charitable activity can and should embrace all people and all needs" (AA no. 8)

During the great natural disasters, which we experience lately, something has to come up that there has to be better co-operation between State and Church agencies. Many things went awry in the aftermath of the Tsunami and Katrina but what needs to be understood is that church agencies with their duty of witnessing to love, give Christian quality to civil agencies in their co-operation.

At this stage the pope expresses a special word of gratitude to the volunteers and their untiring charitable work. These certainly include the knights who have always been the greatest volunteer force in the church and the civil community.

Last but not least there is a link between evangelization and works of charity. It is not enough

to preach which might be convincing logically, but it has to be supported by charitable action which convinces the heart. Most missionary orders knew this quite well when they went out to evangelize in foreign missions. First they built hospitals and schools and then started evangelizing.

Co-operation is needed not only with civic but also with other Christian and faith communities. The pope quotes his predecessor: "We are ready to co-operate with charitable agencies of these churches and communities, since we all have the same goal: a true humanism, which acknowledges that man is made in the image of God and wants to help him to live in a way consonant with that dignity". (S.R.S.)

Grand Knight's Message

February 2007

Brothers

I am sure you share with his family and fellow Brothers the sorrow of the passing of our Brother Reverend John McNamee. For those of us who were fortunate enough to be able to attend prayers and the funeral of St. Bonaventure's founding priest, we heard the tributes and stories of how he lived his life and touched others. Oh, so many others, including myself and family.



Norman Vincent Peale wrote: "enthusiasm is no Pollyannaish, sweetness and light, bright and fortune concept. It is a strong, rugged mental attitude that is hard to achieve, difficult to maintain but powerful-so powerful!" The word enthusiasm from the Greek entheos means God in you or full of God. I would suggest this is the type of priest Father John was.

Bishop Henry, at the funeral, told the story of the priests who had an audience with the Pope. There were ten priests in all and as each was introduced to the Pope they told of their accomplishments and works as a priest, and then kissed the ring of the Pope. The first stated he was the president of a college, the next a professor at a famous university and so and so on, until the final priest who humbly looked at the Pope and quietly said "I am just a Parish Priest". The Pope then kissed both hands of the Priest and announced this was the greatest of Priestly works. The Bishop praised Father John's parish work. Father Raymond De Sousa, at prayers, reflected on how as a young man growing up in this parish Father John sowed the seed so that when he received the call, he was ready to take up Christ's work. Father John touched my family in his own quiet meaningful way when one Sunday he showed up on our doorstep to bring first communion to my son. My son was to receive First Communion however a full - blown case of the chicken pox prevented his attending. In those days First Communion was done on a school basis, so there were dozens receiving. To this day I do not know how Father John came to know of the circumstances. I do know what he did will be forever appreciated by my family.

Many of us can recall how Father John skillfully orchestrated the move from the school to establishing our own church. I say orchestrated as, at that time, there was a push to be more financially effective by combining the church in a school. Then of course there was the matter of raising money for the new church which was in itself an accomplishment of quiet motivation. Father John in his own way would go about influencing parishioners to action.

If you subscribe to the philosophy that success is a journey and not a destination and that the recognition of all the blessings and challenges you are privileged to share during your journey then Father John was very successful.

Ben Sweetland in his book, "I Will", emphasizes that the good things happen on the way to success and never after you get there. You do have to journey however to achieve success. We are certainly fortunate that Brother Father John shared his journey with us. As Knights **ARE WE WILLING TO SHARE OUR JOURNEY ?**

SEDER SUPPER - Celebration of the Passover Meal

On **Saturday, March 31st, 2007**, **St. Bonaventure Council 7432** will celebrate its **18th Annual Seder Supper**. The celebration of the Passover meal, or Seder, recalls the night the angel "passed over" the homes of the Jews, and the rescue of God's chosen people from Egypt. From a Christian view, we celebrate God's rescue of his people, through Jesus, so we may "pass over" from death in sin to life in Christ.

During preparations for Easter and Holy Week, Christians and Jews celebrate their own feasts and we see in these celebrations the common bond of the symbolism of the Exodus. Jesus was a Jew, and through our celebration we draw upon the traditional Jewish Seder and the words of the New Testament to help us more fully appreciate Jesus' observance of His Jewish heritage.

Now on the first day of Unleavened Bread, the disciples came to Jesus to say, "Where do you want us to make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?" (Matthew 26:17)

Few of us appreciate that the Last Supper was a traditional Seder. It was through the powerful symbolism of this celebration and the passion of Jesus that He introduced us to the sacrament of communion where we all share in the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Many symbols are present at our Seder meal: the seven canded **Menorah**, which is lit to represent the light of God and his shining countenance; the **Holy Bible** linking the teachings of the Old Testament (Jewish Law) and the New Testament (the basis of Christianity); the **Paschal lamb**, symbolizes the traditional sacrificial lamb, and for us Christians, we know that Christ is our Lamb, who sacrificed Himself for us; **Matzos** is consumed in memory of the unleavened bread eaten during the flight out of Egypt. It is broken and shared as an expression of unity, the beginnings of our Eucharistic celebrations; **Bitter herbs** are to remind us of the bitterness of the Jews in slavery. We, who are followers of Christ, do not hesitate to taste of this bitterness as a reminder of His passion and death; **Haroses** (a mixture of apples, nuts, cinnamon, and wine) symbolizes the mortar the Jews used for bricks to build the pyramids; **Fresh green herbs** represent the products of the earth and life from God; **Salt water** is the only condiment used, representing the tears of the Jews while in bondage.

The Seder meal is a "**festive Feast**", so participants are requested to **come prepared to eat**, as tradition dictates that all the food prepared is to be consumed. This is not a problem for our Seder, as we enjoy the culinary magic of our own master chef, Bro. Sean Toner.

The evening is always very rewarding, giving those present a greater appreciation of the traditional Seder meal and the resulting ties to Christianity and its spiritual significance during Holy Week.

The celebration begins promptly at 7:00 p.m. in the Parish Centre. **Call Ron Gagnon at 271-3040 for more information or to reserve your spot at our table.**
