## March 2007 Meeting

### **The Distinctive Charitable Activity Of The Church**

Opening Prayer In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

### **The Reading**

(to be read by the Leader)

When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people from one another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand: Come, you that are blessed by the father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.: Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it we saw you sick or in prison and visited you? And the King will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.'

### **The Reflection**

(to be read by the leader)

We have entered the Liturgical Season of Lent and another reason to practice the virtue of charity of which we were reminded on Ash Wednesday.

The love of neighbour is inscribed in our human nature by the creator. God loves his creation and so we love God by loving our neighbour. Beyond this charity is a result of Christian witness in the world. How does this practically look ?

1. Charity is a simple response to immediate needs; feeding the Hungry, clothing the naked (St. Vincent de Paul Society), housing the homeless (Inn from the Cold), visiting the sick (Pastoral

Care). All these organizations look after one or the other aspect and I know that the Knights are involved in all.

2. Charities as organized by a diocese, by the church of a country (Development & Peace), the Universal Church in Caritas Internationalis, are organizations with well-trained professionals to look after greater needs of humanity.

3. In all activities we need the formation of the heart, "a heart which sees", not an ideology like communism. In our emerging need we act spontaneously, but our individual spontaneity should be combined with institutional planning.

4. Avoid proselytism. Love is free, but not without God. In our charitable activity we became credible witnesses of Christ. Love knows when to speak to God. First let your loving action speak. Dear brother knights, let your actions speak also when we try to raise funds for a charitable cause. Lets do it honestly. The end does not justify the means. Let us be aware that charity does not consist in getting other peoples money but rather to take out our wallet and contribute from our own. Lets give our personal Lenten gift

### **Meditation Period**

(The leader now invites the members to spend a few moments in silent reflection as the above text is not meant to be a ready-made answer but a starter for personal reflection on the theme)

### **Fraternal Sharing**

(The leader now invites the members to share with their Brother Knights any relevant thoughts that came to them during the meditation period.)

### **Closing Prayer**

(Recited by all)

Let us pray. God of all compassion, Father of all goodness heal the wounds our sins and selfishness bring upon us. You bid us turn to fasting, prayer and sharing with our brothers and sisters. We acknowledge our sinfulness and weakness, let your compassion fill us with hope and lead us through this penitential time for the beauty of Easter Joy. Grant this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

## Grand Knight's Message

March 2007



Brothers,

When recently discussing with a brother the possibility of him taking on some new responsibilities the dialogue turned to how our Council is administered. Responding to the question caused me to realize there may not be a clear understanding of the various tasks, programs, positions of our Council Leadership. The Officers, Directors and Coordinators provide council Leadership.

**Officers**, in accordance with the constitution are the: Grand Knight, Chaplain, Deputy Grand Knight, Chancellor, Recorder, Financial Secretary, Treasurer, Lecturer, Advocate, Warden, Inside Guard, Outside Guard and Board of Trustees. In our case our Council has chosen to have Trustee positions comprising of 1<sup>st</sup> year, 2<sup>nd</sup> year and 3<sup>rd</sup> year.

All Officers are elected annually with the exception of the Chaplain, Financial Secretary and Lecturer. Trustees may hold the position of Trustee for a period of time not to exceed three years.

Chaplain is a priest selected by the Grand Knight, Deputy Grand Knight and Board of Trustees. The Supreme Knight appoints the Financial Secretary. The Grand Knight appoints the Lecturer.

**Directors** are appointed (volunteer) by the Grand Knight to oversee various groupings of Council Activities and Programs. In our case we have five: Membership, Church, Council, Family and Communication. These may vary from year to year in accordance with the leadership style of the Elected Officers.

**Coordinators** are appointed (volunteer) by the Grand Knight to task a specific activity of the Council. There are some 47 specific established activities; all but 3 have coordinators looking after them, some brothers coordinate more than one activity.

As you can see the Council Leadership is a challenge that is often not easily filled each year. As a result it might take a while to fill a vacant position and often a brother will assume additional tasks, which can often overtax and burn the brother out. This is neither fair nor desirable.

This was a timely conversation because our Constitution directs that election must be held between May 15<sup>th</sup> and June 15<sup>th</sup> each year. Accordingly I need to solicit you, my fellow brothers, to consider filling these positions either by continuing with or taking up new challenges.

I believe it is the enthusiasm demonstrated by the leadership of any organization which determines its success and leads to increasing membership. Norman Vincent Peale wrote: "enthusiasm is no Pollyannish, sweetness and light, bright and fortune concept. It is a strong, rugged mental attitude that is hard to achieve, difficult to maintain but powerful-so powerful!" The word enthusiasm from the Greek entheos means God in you or full of God.

I would ask each and every one of you to seriously consider a leadership role in our Council, no matter what your past contributions have been. Look inside as God has given you the faith, wisdom, courage and strength to deal successfully with life's many challenges. Simply put the Knights need *your* enthusiastic commitment to Leadership. **THINK ABOUT IT!**

## Mustard Seed “Wish List Box” Campaign



As advertised in the Knightline and in the Church Bulletin during the month of February, we had the ‘Wish List Box’ donation boxes set up in the Church. The top item on the Wish List was Bus Tickets. With them, the Mustard Seed’s destitute residents can accept employment in any part of the city and get on their feet sooner. The next items related to personal hygiene and appearance, namely large bath towels and disposable razors. Clothing that allows people dignity and comfort in public was also asked for in the form of work shirts and dress shirts.

The ‘Wish List Box’ drive was a real winner for the ‘Seed. Besides the Council’s own donation of \$744.13 for the purchase of bus tickets, the items we took to the Mustard Seed included: 10 books of bus tickets, 108 bath towels, 262 disposable razors, 110 golf/casual/cowboy shirts, 24 work shirts, 73 dress shirts, 13 pairs of work pants and other men’s and ladies items too numerous to mention. Our partners in this venture did not fare as well as they had in the ‘Sox Box’ drive, but managed to collect 4 bath towels and hand towels. We thank Brookfield Properties sincerely for their efforts.

The Mustard Seed was very grateful for the generosity of our Council, St. Bonaventure Parishioners and all donors who made this project such a success.

# Mustard Seed Street Ministry Support Visit

We returned to the Mustard Seed Street Ministry for our second visit of this Columbian Year on Sunday February 11<sup>th</sup> to help prepare and serve lunch. It had been a cold night and we saw that there was an overflow of additional people on mats when we arrived for our shift - underscoring the necessity of such a caring facility as this.

Meals are cooked in the new kitchen facility downstairs. This particular Sunday was deemed 'leftovers day' meaning, just like at home, leftovers 'from the fridge' are made into a nutritious lunch. It was substantial – salad, stir-fry, rice, hamburgers and gravy, dinner roll and varied desserts. We were all ready for a busy morning of meal prep, but between the new efficient kitchen and leftovers on the menu, it was actually a morning of relatively light tasks. Further, the midday meal is not intended for the community-at-large, but for the residents and councillors, so we expected to need fewer volunteers. The meal later in the day is open to all. I can vouch that there was a never-ending stream of dishes to wash, however.

While we did our preparation for the 'Seed's lunch, we helped the regular kitchen staff prepare a hot-dog lunch for the 315 people staying overnight at the Brick temporary shelter, another very necessary care facility.

The second shift was that of serving the meal. We firstly had to move the meal in heated service trolleys from the downstairs kitchen to the renovated former kitchen area upstairs. It was constructed so that two parallel streams of patrons can file past serving windows on either side of the serving area. The serving volunteers (us, plus a few new recruits) dished out the food onto plates as the patrons walked past. As the meal service progressed from 12 noon until 1:30 PM, the menu gradually evolved into different entrees on either serving side until all were served. We did not get an accurate count of the number of meals served, but we were fairly busy the whole shift and so it turned out to be a very worthwhile effort.

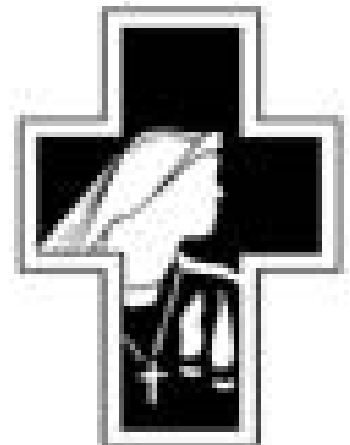

## SEDER SUPPER - Celebration of the Passover Meal

On **Saturday, March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2007**, **St. Bonaventure Council 7432** will celebrate its **18th Annual Seder Supper**. The celebration of the Passover meal, or Seder, recalls the night the angel "passed over" the homes of the Jews, and the rescue of God's chosen people from Egypt. From a Christian view, we celebrate God's rescue of his people, through Jesus, so we may "pass over" from death in sin to life in Christ.

During preparations for Easter and Holy Week, Christians and Jews celebrate their own feasts and we see in these celebrations the common bond of the symbolism of the Exodus. Jesus was a Jew, and through our celebration we draw upon the traditional Jewish Seder and the words of the New Testament to help us more fully appreciate Jesus' observance of His Jewish heritage.

*Now on the first day of Unleavened Bread, the disciples came to Jesus to say, "Where do you want us to make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?" (Matthew 26:17)*

Few of us appreciate that the Last Supper was a traditional Seder. It was through the powerful symbolism of this celebration and the passion of Jesus that He introduced us to the sacrament of communion where we all share in the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Many symbols are present at our Seder meal: the seven canded **Menorah**, which is lit to represent the light of God and his shining countenance; the **Holy Bible** linking the teachings of the Old Testament (Jewish Law) and the New Testament (the basis of Christianity); the **Paschal lamb**, symbolizes the traditional sacrificial lamb, and for us Christians, we know that Christ is our Lamb, who sacrificed Himself for us; **Mat-zos** is consumed in memory of the unleavened bread eaten during the flight out of Egypt. It is broken and shared as an expression of unity, the beginnings of our Eucharistic celebrations; **Bitter herbs** are to remind us of the bitterness of the Jews in slavery. We, who are followers of Christ, do not hesitate to taste of this bitterness as a reminder of His passion and death; **Haroses** (a mixture of apples, nuts, cinnamon, and wine) symbolizes the mortar the Jews used for bricks to build the pyramids; **Fresh green herbs** represent the products of the earth and life from God; **Salt water** is the only condiment used, representing the tears of the Jews while in bondage.

The Seder meal is a "**festive Feast**", so participants are requested to **come prepared to eat**, as tradition dictates that all the food prepared is to be consumed. This is not a problem for our Seder, as we enjoy the culinary magic of our own master chef, Bro. Sean Toner.

The evening is always very rewarding, giving those present a greater appreciation of the traditional Seder meal and the resulting ties to Christianity and its spiritual significance during Holy Week.

The celebration begins promptly at 7:00 p.m. in the Parish Centre. **Call Ron Gagnon at 271-3040 for more information or to reserve your spot at our table.**


