Jesus the Proclaimer of the New Law

Opening Prayer

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Reading *(to be read by the Leader)*

Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. Amen, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or the smallest part of a letter will pass from the law, until all things have taken place. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do so will be called least in the kingdom of heaven. But whoever obeys and teaches these commandments will be called greatest in the kingdom of heaven. I tell you, unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter into the kingdom of heaven (Matthew: 5, 17-20)

The Reflection *(to be read by the leader)*

While the beatitudes show us Christ as the perfect servant of God, the second part of the sermon on the mount shows Jesus as the new Moses, who not only explains the old Law in new and exacting ways, but also gives his own law. "You have heard that it was said to those of ancient time. But I say to you..." (Mt 5, 21,22). Straight forward!

How willing are we to except the Law of Christ? Do we accept the ten commandments in the Old Testament as the basis for our moral behaviour? Jesus was crucified and died under the punishment of blaspheming, because he made himself God. This was the judgement of the High Priest. Here we can recognize that he is the Son of God who fulfills, and wants everybody, to fulfill the Law. But then he wants more, to go beyond the physical action. Death can be inflicted by physically killing, by word of mouth, by how we look at others. Every transgression begins in the mind and heart before it is acted out and so Jesus invites us to control our mind and senses to avoid evil-doing as the Apostle Paul tells us "the Law of Christ makes you free (Of. Galatians)."

Freedom from sin is Christ's desire for us. Perfection, being holy, is the aim of Christ's Law" Be perfect as your father (God) in heaven is perfect." (Mt. 5, 48). We all know that our striving for holiness is subject to all the pitfalls of our human weakness and Christ knows this but still he asks us to go for it. Why? Because he wants to help us as our brother, to walk with us. Remember the poem "Footprints": he walks with us and he carries us. He sends us the Holy Spirit, the advocate who teaches us everything, who assists us in our problems. What is your decision? Do you want to be perfect and run your own life in the freedom of Christ? Or do you want to let life run you in slavery and you will become the least in the kingdom of heaven?

(The leader now invites the members to spend a few moments in silent reflection as the above text is not meant to be a ready-made answer but a starter for personal reflection on the theme)

(The leader now invites the members to share with their Brother Knights any relevant thoughts that came to them during the meditation period.)

Closing Prayer *(Recited by all) Let us pray together*

Father, in the rising of your Son, death gives birth to new life. The sufferings he endured restored hope to a fallen world.

Let sin never ensnare us with empty promises of passing joy. Make us one with you always, so that our joy may be holy, and our love may give life. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

February 2008

Your preparation is meant to be a path of discovery, of catechesis and of celebration of God's gift for the life of the world".

Our council ***Knightline*** will publish one of these educational sheets each month until the IEC in June of 2008. It is hoped that these reflections will lead you and our parish communities, in union with all members of the Body of Christ, to a deeper understanding of the Eucharist as we prepare for the 2008 IEC.

Eucharist: a body to build

"The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?" (1 Cor. 10.16)

There is a grace that draws us to the table of the Lord, a joy and delight in knowing more is happening than the human eye can see. Life in the Risen Lord stems from this banquet feast. Scripture and Sacrament show us the way to live. The selfless offering of Christ invites us into total commitment.

Commitment to what? To making the one body whole. Loving as Christ loved requires that we make relationships right. Eating and drinking of Christ's body and blood shifts our focus from self to others. To build the body is to improve the disunion in our lives, neighbourhoods, cities, world. We commit to seek places that cry out for reconciliation, healing, mending. We commit to build the body of Christ.

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

How did Jesus build right relationships?

Where is there brokenness in your neighbourhood??

FAMILY ACTIVITIES

Volunteer an hour at your local food bank. Talk about the experience and see if there is a way to build a relationship with the people you met.

Participate in cleaning up the environment. Follow this activity with a conversation about earth, the soil, the trees, plants as part of the body God has created to thrive.

PRAYER

Direct the course of this world, Lord God,
and order it in your peace,

that your Church may serve you
in serenity and quiet joy.

We ask this through Christ our Lord
in the power of the Holy Spirit.

SEDER SUPPER - Celebration of the Passover Meal

On Saturday, March 15th, 2008, **St. Bonaventure Council 7432** will celebrate its **19th Annual Seder Supper**. The celebration of the Passover meal, or Seder, recalls the night the angel "passed over" the homes of the Jews, and the rescue of God's chosen people from Egypt. From a Christian view, we celebrate God's rescue of his people, through Jesus, so we may "pass over" from death in sin to life in Christ.

During preparations for Easter and Holy Week, Christians and Jews celebrate their own feasts and we see in these celebrations the common bond of the symbolism of the Exodus. Jesus was a Jew, and through our celebration we draw upon the traditional Jewish Seder and the words of the New Testament to help us more fully appreciate Jesus' observance of His Jewish heritage.

Now on the first day of Unleavened Bread, the disciples came to Jesus to say, "Where do you want us to make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?" (Matthew 26:17)

Few of us appreciate that the Last Supper was a traditional Seder. It was through the powerful symbolism of this celebration and the passion of Jesus that He introduced us to the sacrament of communion where we all share in the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Many symbols are present at our Seder meal: the seven canded **Menorah**, which is lit to represent the light of God and his shining countenance; the **Holy Bible** linking the teachings of the Old Testament (Jewish Law) and the New Testament (the basis of Christianity); the **Paschal lamb**, symbolizes the traditional sacrificial lamb, and for us Christians, we know that Christ is our Lamb, who sacrificed Himself for us; **Matzos** is consumed in memory of the unleavened bread eaten during the flight out of Egypt. It is broken and shared as an expression of unity, the beginnings of our Eucharistic celebrations; **Bitter herbs** are to remind us of the bitterness of the Jews in slavery. We, who are followers of Christ, do not hesitate to taste of this bitterness as a reminder of His passion and death; **Haroses** (a mixture of apples, nuts, cinnamon, and wine) symbolizes the mortar the Jews used for bricks to build the pyramids; **Fresh green herbs** represent the products of the earth and life from God; **Salt water** is the only condiment used, representing the tears of the Jews while in bondage.

The Seder meal is a "**festive Feast**", so participants are requested to **come prepared to eat**, as tradition dictates that all the food prepared is to be consumed. This is not a problem for our Seder, as we enjoy the culinary magic of our own master chef, Bro. Sean Toner.

The evening is always very rewarding, giving those present a greater appreciation of the traditional Seder meal and the resulting ties to Christianity and its spiritual significance during Holy Week.

The celebration begins promptly at 7:00 p.m. in the Parish Centre.

Student of the Month Program Knights of Columbus St. Bonaventure Council No. 7432

The Knights of Columbus, St. Bonaventure Council have been active in honoring students from Don Bosco and St. Bonaventure junior high schools by presenting them with a wrist watch. The students are selected by the staff at the respective schools and the presentations occur in conjunction with the awards program at each school. Don Bosco School recognizes one student per month from the total junior high population. St. Bonaventure School recognizes one student per grade each reporting period. As a result, 19 students per year are recognized through this program.

The watches have been purchased as needed from the Deer Valley Zellers store and it should be noted that the manager of the store has graciously offered them to our council at a discount.

Whenever possible, the author of this report has attempted to be available to present the watches personally to the recipients. An effort is made to mention the role that the knights of Columbus play in the parish at each of these ceremonies.

FUND RAISING VENTURE

Our Council has recently approved a new fund raising initiative. It is the **Safeway “Community Caring Coupon Booklet”** program. The booklets, in minimum bundles of 10, are offered to various charities and community groups to assist in their fund raising efforts. To date, Council #7432 has approved a purchase of 80 booklets.

Each booklet costs the purchaser \$20.00. *The \$20.00 purchase price can be recovered totally by shopping at Safeway 4 times and presenting a “\$5.00 off” coupon for each grocery transaction over \$50.00.* Non food items such as postage stamps and prescriptions do not qualify as part of the \$50.00 purchase required.

The ‘Community Caring Coupon Booklet’ has other offerings in addition to the 4 coupons that recover the total cost of the booklet. There are --- 3 Air Miles offers for 10 times the reward miles on a \$50.00 order..... 14 coupons offering \$1.00 off selected products and..... a \$5.00 off value on the purchase of an Unforgettable Floral arrangement. All the coupons expire December 31, 2008 so there’s lots of time to redeem them!

Every fund raising initiative Council #7432 undertakes requires some of your time and effort. *The pay-back here is \$8.00 from Safeway for each “Community Caring Coupon Booklet” the Knights’ of Council #7432 sells. That’s a 40% return! And...the purchaser gets the \$20.00 back by redeeming the four \$5.00 coupons.*

We raised \$320.00 by the end of December 2007 by participating in Safeway’s Community Caring program. We are now on our 2nd round of 40 booklets with 29 of them sold to friends and relatives who are true supporters of our Council. We have 11 Community Caring Booklets remaining to be sold. Once we have completed this 2nd drive, we will have raised another \$320.00.

Should you know of anyone who may purchase a booklet, please e-mail or leave a phone message for Lou Hogan to acquire some, and remember, they can be sold or given as a gift to family or friends even if they are not in the Calgary area. The coupons are redeemable at any Safeway store in Canada.

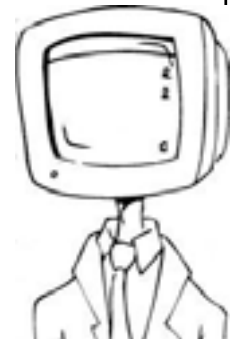

PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2007 SEASON

The following table summarizes the 2007 Handi-Boat season:

No. Passengers	Number of Trips	No. Of Captains	No. Of Crew	Cancellations	New Clients
409; 79 in wheel chairs	41 scheduled; 31 completed	4 full time and 2 part time	14	10 - 8 weather - 1 no bus - 1 no Captain	5 plus one cancellation was a new client.

Although we made one more trip than last year, we took out approximately 100 fewer people. This was because we had fewer children this year and more adult trips. We also had 10 cancellations eight of which were in August due to adverse weather. We also had to cancel one trip in September because we did not have a Captain.

Although we started the year with six full time Captains and one part time Captain, we struggled through most of the year with only four Captains. One newly recruited Captain could not make any trips due to business commitments and, similarly, one full time Captain resigned due to work conflicts. We truly need five Captains in order to avoid burn out and this will be a priority for next year.

The Handi-Boat continues to be a popular recreational alternative for both seniors and children's groups. We had five new clients this year, one of which was a children's group. Having experienced the joy of a Handi-Boat excursion, they intend to book multiple trips next year. Another first-time benefactor of the Handi-Boat was the Sharp Foundation, which is an organization dedicated to improving the lives of those suffering from HIV/AIDS.

The Handi-Boat Society of Alberta continues to be in reasonable shape financially with approximately \$8K in our operating account and \$19K in our capital account. Insurance remains our largest single expense running at more than \$4K annually. An audit will be completed in the New Year. **Please note, however, that for the past two years our operating expenses have exceeded our revenue by about \$2K per year. Councils and Assemblies are urged to donate even if it's only \$100.**

Our barbeque finally gave up the ghost this year after nine faithful years of service. Additionally, after nine years there are a number of "wear and tear" type items that will be addressed in the off-season. The canopy needs repair, the depth/fish finder is kaput (donations anyone?) and the motor needs to be tuned up. We also replaced the trailer tires.

Fortunately we had no operational or maintenance incidents. I am pleased to report that all our Captains have a valid Transport Canada Boat Operators License, which is two years ahead of schedule. The Santa Maria has been taken out of the water and stored for the winter. I would like to thank Bob Watts, who is a resident at Ghost Lake for storing the batteries for the winter.

I would like to welcome Garry Woytas and Wes Carr to our Board of Directors and I would like to thank all of our Captains and Crew Members who donated their time this year.

2007 marked the tenth year since our founding. I would like to thank the Knights and their wives for all of their service, financial support and their prayers for the past ten years. Keep it coming! 2008 will mark 10 years of operation and we intend to have some special events then. Further details will be forthcoming early next year.

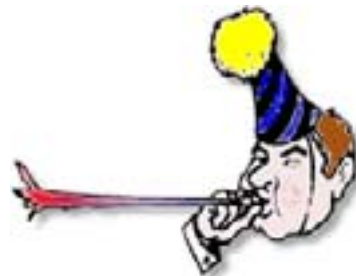



HISTORY OF THE KNIGHTS

The Knights of Columbus was founded in 1882 by a 29-year-old parish priest, Fr. Michael J. McGivney, in the basement of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, CT. Today, more than a century later, the Knights of Columbus has become the largest lay organization in the Catholic Church.

The Order has been called "the strong right arm of the Church," and has been praised by popes, presidents and other world leaders, for support of the Church, programs of evangelization and Catholic education, civic involvement and aid to those in need. Founded during era of anti-Catholic bigotry, the Knights has championed religious rights throughout its 121-year history.

Since it was incorporated on March 29, 1882, the Knights of Columbus has grown from several members in one council to more than 12,000 councils and over 1.6 million members throughout the United States, Canada, the Philippines, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Panama, the Bahamas, the Virgin Islands, Guatemala, Guam and Saipan.
