Jesus the Teacher of Prayer**

Opening Prayer

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Reading *(read by the Leader)*

In praying, do not babble like the pagans, who think that they will be heard because of their many words. Do not be like them. Your Father knows what you need before you ask him. “This is how you pray: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread; and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors; and do not subject us to the final test, but deliver us from the evil one.” (Matt 6, 7-13)

The Reflection *(read by the leader)*

“If being human is all about relating to God, then prayer, as speaking and listening to God, is an essential part of it.” Most spiritual writers would certainly agree with the Pope. Their constant dealing with prayer, particularly the Our Father, has filled pages over pages. The Catechism of the Catholic Church when it deals with prayer expands on the Our Father. The Our Father is a short prayer to the point as the Pope says “The other false form of prayer the Lord warns us against is the chatter, the verbiage that smothers the spirit.” It seems to be very masculine a few words to connect with God. How often do we pray the Our Father? But often we feel that it has not the effect it should have, because we are distracted or our heart is not open to submit to God. The Pope advises us again; “The first thing we must do is step outside ourselves and open ourselves to God. Nothing can turn out right if our relation to God is not rightly ordered. For this reason the Our Father begins with God and then, from that starting point, shows us the way towards being human.”

Our Father – God has us all created individually – we are unique

Hallowed be thy name – Man may misuse God’s name

Thy kingdom come – May you become the true ruler of all nations

Thy will be done – How do we recognize God’s will in our personal life? Meditation.

Our daily bread – In the last analysis a gift for God, even when it comes from man’s labour.

Mutual forgiveness – God is always ready, are we?

Help & deliverance in temptation – God does not tempt but he wants us to deal with temptation as Jesus did.

May the Our Father always be our best prayer because it comes from God himself. (cf. St. Cyprian).

(The leader now invites the members to spend a few moments in silent reflection as the above text is not meant to be a ready-made answer but a starter for personal reflection on the theme)

Fraternal Sharing

(The leader now invites the members to share with their Brother Knights any relevant thoughts that came to them during the meditation period.)

Closing Prayer *(Recited by all) Let us pray together*

Father of everlasting goodness, our origin and guide, be close to us and hear the prayers of all who praise you. Forgive our sins and restore us to life. Keep us safe in your love. Grant this through Christ Our Lord. Amen.

Incarnation

In this context, I entered my spiritual journey as a kind of "winter hike" to reflect, to revitalize, and to awaken a sense of the reality of God with faith and love. Jesus chose to go away to spend some quiet time, and refreshing moments with His Father. Likewise, this was a call to men from the Lord, and a gift from the parish to go away, and restore our hearts for the service of God's Kingdom. Everything was good, including the food, which gave us full energy to begin our retreat well. The retreat preacher stressed on different stages of human life with integrity so that we can truly understand the meaning of Lent by discovering ourselves who we really are. He said that "We all have a spiritual character defect, and that defect is SIN" Our life makes us understand our spiritual heart where love resides in us only if one looks at one's life very seriously. Keeping this thought in mind, this retreat gave me a chance to reflect on how different stages of life shape everything in our life. The retreat, in a way, created a framework to get closer to God, and also to figure out what my true self and true path is.

Each one needs this retreat experience to be enabled to reflect on one's life, and share that experience with others. Life is a journey, and this journey should always be in the process of "soul growing" in our everyday life. This retreat provided me an opportunity to maintain spiritual focus in my life during this whole Lenten journey.

Mustard Seed Street Ministry Support Visit

We went to help the Mustard Seed Street Ministry prepare and serve the dinner meal on Sunday February 3rd at the Seed's Foothills Shelter, located in the Foothills Industrial Area. The dinner meal is open to all residents of the shelter. In fact, about 380 persons had slept there the night before.

The kitchen is about the same size as the downtown building's kitchen, but it is on ground level, not downstairs. As is the custom on Sundays, leftovers from the fridge are made into the evening meal. As with leftovers at home, there was less meal prep work. However, to ensure that our time was well spent, John, the chef for whom we have worked before in the downtown kitchen, brought us enough of the remaining prep work for that meal and prep work for some of the following week's meals to keep us busy the entire 4 – 6:30 PM shift. It was not difficult work by any stretch, and after the shift we looked up to find that we had diced scores of onions, had cut tons of meat, had made hundreds of sandwiches and had laid out many trays of desserts and other items.

We changed over some of our weary volunteers for fresh troops at 6:30 PM and soon plunged into the next shift with the serving windows opening at 7 PM sharp. The kitchen was constructed so that two parallel streams of guests can file past two sets of serving windows where we dished out the food, cafeteria-style, onto their plates. As the meal service progressed, the menu gradually evolved into different entrees (shepherds pie ... to ... ham steaks ... to ... bratwurst sausages ...to ... chicken a la king) until all were served, and seconds or thirds, if desired. We were busy that whole shift as well. When we finally closed the windows, we found out that 592 suppers were served.

“Wish List Box” Campaign

As advertised in the Knightline and in Church Bulletins, we held the Mustard Seed ‘Wish List Box’ donation drive during the month of February. We were aided in our efforts by Brookfield Properties, Petro-Canada Centre, who kindly put a similar appeal in their tenant newsletter. We placed two big drop boxes in the narthex of the Church and one in the information kiosk at Petro-Canada Centre and emptied them regularly during the month.

The items on the Wish List marked ‘Urgent’ were: disposable razors, mittens/gloves, new underwear, jeans, warm clothing, new socks, new twin bedding sheets and comforters. Although not in the ‘Urgent’ category, other items such as general clothing items, footwear and bus tickets were also requested.

I am pleased to report that we once again had a very successful campaign. Between the two locations, donations of urgently needed items included 171 razors, 31 mitts/gloves, 7 dozen underwear items, 31 pairs of jeans, 14 winter jackets and coats, 190 pairs of socks, 18 twin bed sheets and 5 blankets and comforters. Other notable items donated included 48 sweaters, 89 tubes of travel size toothpaste tubes and 92 bus tickets and \$5 cash along with other men’s and ladies items too numerous to mention.

As we took over 35 large bags of items to the Donations Door in front of the Mustard Seed during the month, we saw how important they are to these needy people and how grateful the folks are for such amazing generosity.

SEDER SUPPER - Celebration of the Passover Meal

On Saturday, March 15th, 2008, **St. Bonaventure Council 7432** will celebrate its **19th Annual Seder Supper**. The celebration of the Passover meal, or Seder, recalls the night the angel "passed over" the homes of the Jews, and the rescue of God's chosen people from Egypt. From a Christian view, we celebrate God's rescue of his people, through Jesus, so we may "pass over" from death in sin to life in Christ.

During preparations for Easter and Holy Week, Christians and Jews celebrate their own feasts and we see in these celebrations the common bond of the symbolism of the Exodus. Jesus was a Jew, and through our celebration we draw upon the traditional Jewish Seder and the words of the New Testament to help us more fully appreciate Jesus' observance of His Jewish heritage.

Now on the first day of Unleavened Bread, the disciples came to Jesus to say, "Where do you want us to make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?" (Matthew 26:17)

Few of us appreciate that the Last Supper was a traditional Seder. It was through the powerful symbolism of this celebration and the passion of Jesus that He introduced us to the sacrament of communion where we all share in the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Many symbols are present at our Seder meal: the seven canded **Menorah**, which is lit to represent the light of God and his shining countenance; the **Holy Bible** linking the teachings of the Old Testament (Jewish Law) and the New Testament (the basis of Christianity); the **Paschal lamb**, symbolizes the traditional sacrificial lamb, and for us Christians, we know that Christ is our Lamb, who sacrificed Himself for us; **Matzos** is consumed in memory of the unleavened bread eaten during the flight out of Egypt. It is broken and shared as an expression of unity, the beginnings of our Eucharistic celebrations; **Bitter herbs** are to remind us of the bitterness of the Jews in slavery. We, who are followers of Christ, do not hesitate to taste of this bitterness as a reminder of His passion and death; **Haroses** (a mixture of apples, nuts, cinnamon, and wine) symbolizes the mortar the Jews used for bricks to build the pyramids; **Fresh green herbs** represent the products of the earth and life from God; **Salt water** is the only condiment used, representing the tears of the Jews while in bondage.

The Seder meal is a "**festive Feast**", so participants are requested to **come prepared to eat**, as tradition dictates that all the food prepared is to be consumed. This is not a problem for our Seder, as we enjoy the culinary magic of our own master chef, Brother Sean Toner.

The evening is always very rewarding, giving those present a greater appreciation of the traditional Seder meal and the resulting ties to Christianity and its spiritual significance during Holy Week.

The celebration begins promptly at 7:00 p.m. in the Parish Centre. Cost is \$17.50 per person which includes everything for the evening. Call Art Gordon at 271-7923 or email (poppagordon@shaw.ca) by March 08, 2008 for more information or to reserve your spot at our table.

FUND RAISING VENTURE

Our Council has recently approved a new fund raising initiative. It is the **Safeway “Community Caring Coupon Booklet”** program. The booklets, in minimum bundles of 10, are offered to various charities and community groups to assist in their fund raising efforts. To date, Council #7432 has approved a purchase of 80 booklets.

Each booklet costs the purchaser \$20.00. *The \$20.00 purchase price can be recovered totally by shopping at Safeway 4 times and presenting a “\$5.00 off” coupon for each grocery transaction over \$50.00.* Non food items such as postage stamps and prescriptions do not qualify as part of the \$50.00 purchase required.

The ‘Community Caring Coupon Booklet’ has other offerings in addition to the 4 coupons that recover the total cost of the booklet. There are --- 3 Air Miles offers for 10 times the reward miles on a \$50.00 order..... 14 coupons offering \$1.00 off selected products and..... a \$5.00 off value on the purchase of an Unforgettable Floral arrangement. All the coupons expire December 31, 2008 so there’s lots of time to redeem them!

Every fund raising initiative Council #7432 undertakes requires some of your time and effort. *The pay-back here is \$8.00 from Safeway for each “Community Caring Coupon Booklet” the Knights’ of Council #7432 sells. That’s a 40% return! And...the purchaser gets the \$20.00 back by redeeming the four \$5.00 coupons.*

We raised \$320.00 by the end of December 2007 by participating in Safeway’s Community Caring program. We are now on our 2nd round of 40 booklets with 29 of them sold to friends and relatives who are true supporters of our Council. We have 11 Community Caring Booklets remaining to be sold. Once we have completed this 2nd drive, we will have raised another \$320.00.

Should you know of anyone who may purchase a booklet, please e-mail or leave a phone message for Lou Hogan to acquire some, and remember, they can be sold or given as a gift to family or friends even if they are not in the Calgary area. The coupons are redeemable at any Safeway store in Canada.

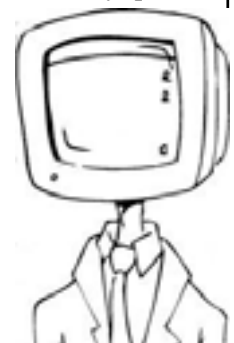

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

The Knights of Columbus was founded in 1882 by a 29-year-old parish priest, Fr. Michael J. McGivney, in the basement of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, CT. Today, more than a century later, the Knights of Columbus has become the largest lay organization in the Catholic Church.



The Order has been called "the strong right arm of the Church," and has been praised by popes, presidents and other world leaders, for support of the Church, programs of evangelization and Catholic education, civic involvement and aid to those in need. Founded during era of anti-Catholic bigotry, the Knights has championed religious rights throughout its 121-year history.

Since it was incorporated on March 29, 1882, the Knights of Columbus has grown from several members in one council to more than 12,000 councils and over 1.6 million members throughout the United States, Canada, the Philippines, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Panama, the Bahamas, the Virgin Islands, Guatemala, Guam and Saipan.
